75 Years of History & Heritage, 1946 - 2021



As an extraordinary act of gratitude, the Beetham Crib was constructed by the Prisoners of War at Bela Camp, Whassett and presented at Christmas 1946 as a gift to the people of Beetham. "By doing so we will express our gratefulness for having been able to realize the real spirit of Christian brotherhood. which has been proved to us by the Hon. Rev. A MacLeod Murray and the congregation of Beetham. We are praying with you to THE CHILD OF BETHLEHEM"

The original inscription remains to this day on the West wall of the nave of the Church. The passing years had, however, begun to take its toll on the beautiful stable, backdrop and hand-painted figures of the nativity scene. Earlier this year we resolved to ensure that the Beetham Crib continues to witness Christian love for at least another 75 years, or more! Thanks to the generosity of donors we have been able to restore the crib to a condition worthy of its original craftsmanship.

The initial cleaning of the figures was carried out as a labour of love by Hog & Fitch, in the persons of Margaret Reid and Angela Bell: we are enormously indebted to them for their expertise, time, trouble and advice. The condition of the stable and its backboard was more concerning and, after seeking expert advice the specialist furniture restorers Wynn Griffiths & Tarr were engaged to re-stabilise and repair the Crib. Together with Julia Allison, textiles specialist, the Crib can once again now be seen as originally presented to the Church in 1946!

Sunday 28th November marks the beginning of Advent so the Crib will be on display in the Church throughout the Advent period leading to Christmas and then through Epiphany until Candlemas (2nd February) which marks the end of the festival season.

We hope that as many people as possible of the Parish of Beetham and surrounds will have an opportunity during this season to witness this beautiful artefact - a true expression of Christian love.

'The Miss Whittles' (as they were known)

The Miss Whittles were three sisters who were a special and much loved part of Beetham village and of the Church of St. Michael and All Angels. The family had moved to Beetham in 1947 from Scotforth to take up the cultivation of a smallholding in High Cote Lane. The three girls, Marjorie, Elsie and Edith were the daughters of a very strict father who did not believe in 'idle hands'. Waking time was spent working on the smallholding and when the sun set and the light dimmed they occupied themselves with a variety of craftwork.

The sisters formed a close family and none of the girls married. The Church was an important part of their lives. They all sang regularly in the Choir; they were to be found carol singing all round the parish every evening of the two weeks before Christmas, accompanied at times by a varying number of other members of the congregation. This they undertook without fail for fifty years. To recognise this devoted service, Reverend Philip Barber was instrumental in their being invited to a Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in 1998. Marjorie, Elsie and Edith organised a variety of craft sales for Church funds where their handiwork in sewing, knitting, crochet, basketry, floristry etc were all on show. They were enthusiastic members of the WI and travelled in their camper van, driven by Elsie, to many flower and handicraft shows all over northern England.

They loved flowers and grew a wide variety which they arranged regularly in the Church and set the standard for the exceptional quality of flower

arranging which is to be found in the Church at the major festivals, the Flower Weekend and on other special occasions. Which small parish Church owns eleven flower pedestals? This is largely due to the enthusiasm and dedication of the three sisters and we are honoured and proud to follow where they have led.

Sadly Marjorie became ill and died in 2000. Her passing was commemorated with a memorial on the flower pedestal to be found by the Screen. Elsie and Edith continued without her for a short time and then moved from High Cote Lane to Westmorland Court, where Elsie died in 2008 and Edith in 2010. A memorial to the two younger sisters will be dedicated this month and is to be found on the flower pedestal in the Sanctuary, mounted on wood from the box used by the last Verger, Valerie Holden.

Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends

Over recent years the arrival of the John Lewis & Partners Christmas advert has generated guite a lot of anticipation and interest. In many ways its appearance on our television screens almost synonymous with the arrival of the festive season, signalling as it does a rather intense period of getting ready for the upcoming season of celebrations with all the busyness and energy that comes as we look ahead to the twenty fifth of December.

This year the advert is entitled 'The Unexpected Guest' and tells the story of an alien that has crash landed on earth and is soon befriended by an inquisitive and generous child who is keen to show kindness and offer practical help. As the haunting music plays (a slowed down solo version of the eighties classic 'Together in Electric Dreams') we see in various scenes the two characters enjoying time together: decorating Christmas trees, throwing snowballs at each other, watching television, sharing friendship and learning more about each other. In order to care for his new friend, the boy in the story takes food from his meals in order to share and spends time teaching the alien more about the planet they've found themselves on. Thus, as the advert plays out, a genuine and heartfelt relationship emerges, sure to pull on the heartstrings of even the most reserved and unemotional viewer. Of course, the advert reaches its (perhaps expected) conclusion when the alien, fresh from repairing their spaceship, prepares to leave the forest and continue their journey. The final act being a moment where the child gives his departing friend a gift, no doubt from the John Lewis Christmas catalogue, to persuade us all watching of the place to go for our purchases this year.

It would be easy to dismiss the above as simply good advertising and marketing. A vaguely sentimental story that draws the audience in, follows an easy to guess plot and leaves us in a place where we might be tempted to indulge in some Christmas shopping. Yet, I find the fact that the advert is called 'The Unexpected Guest' quite interesting, not least when it's considered within the greater context of the narrative of what is so often called 'the greatest story ever told'. That story which provides the focus and foundation for our keeping and celebrating of Christmas in the first place, the birth of Jesus Christ in Bethlehem over two thousand years ago.

In many ways, given the world and history that Jesus was born into, it would be easy to say that Jesus was in fact the expected guest. The history of Israel and the message of the prophets encouraged God's people to look forward to a day when the long-awaited Messiah would indeed arrive. The difficulties, trials, sorrows and troubles of the present were framed by a hope that one day God would intervene and establish justice, peace, righteousness and goodness for all people. When God first spoke to Abraham, he foretold that in him 'all the families of the earth shall be blessed' (Genesis 12.3). And in the book of the prophet Isaiah, we read of God's promise to his people that one day those that walk-in darkness would see 'a great light', that one day a child would be born, a son given, who would be called 'Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace' (Isaiah 9.6).

Yet, despite these great hopes that were part and parcel of the world into which Jesus was born into. There is little doubt that God's choice of intervening in human history through being born amongst us as the holy child of Bethlehem is altogether surprising and unexpected. The crib and manager were far removed from a royal palace or site of prominence, Mary and Joseph didn't have the benefit of bijous or salubrious surroundings, itinerant shepherds would hardly be first on anyone's guest list for visitors following childbirth, the threats spoken by King Herod fearful of any attempt to disturb his presumed authority didn't necessarily provide the best setting for a child to be born into.



However, the wonder, mystery, joy and pledge of the Nativity, of the story of Christmas that we tell year after year is that all such as this was God's deliberate and decided choice. God chose, intentionally and carefully, to come amongst us in this particular way. Into the mud, the mess and the pain of life, to reach out to marginalised places and disregarded peoples offering a hope that could not and will not disappoint, to reveal to us the love that God has for the world he has made and demonstrate how his heart is for every one of us. Such was the mission of that unexpected guest all those many years ago in an easily forgotten place in a strange time. Far away from where we might expect God to be, yet fundamentally exactly where God told us he would be - coming to us in simplicity, in humility and fragility, offering his love so that we could love in return.

May the wonder and joy of that first Christmas be yours in the days ahead. And may you find grace, time and opportunity amidst all that you will be doing to make yourself open to receiving that most unexpected of guests, Jesus Christ himself, who is God-with-us, Emmanuel, evermore and evermore.




