Here are the answers to last month's 'Hats and Headgear' round, with additional background information from Clive:-

Which headgear...

Q1...fell under Svengali's spell? TRILBY. The eponymous heroine of George du Maurier's novel (1895), hypnotized by the wicked Svengali. The trilby hat is named after the hat worn by Trilby

Q2...surprisingly originated in Ecuador? The **PANAMA** hat originated in Ecuador, and gained the name 'Panama' when Ecuadorian hat makers emigrated to Panama in the 1850s.

Q3...is reminiscent of Fred and Ginger? TOP HAT was a very popular 1935 film starring Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers

Q4...should ideally be 45.46? Think metric and then convert! 45.46 litres = 10 gallons, therefore TEN GALLON HAT (just like Hopalong Cassidy used to wear).

Q5...owes its origin to 'Rabby'? The TAM o'SHANTER is named after the character Tam in Robert Burns's poem TAM o'SHANTER (1791). Presumably he wore a hat of that style.

Q6...should engage your interest? A FASCINATOR should engage your interest.

Q7...casts your mind back to the Babes? The 'Babes' were the Manchester United team managed by Matt **BUSBY**, many of whom perished in the 1959 Munich air crash.

Q8...was favoured by Mary of Teck? Mary of Teck (i.e. Queen Mary, wife of King George V) was often to be seen wearing a TOQUE.

Q9...was probably worn by J, Harris and George? J., Harris and George were the Three Men in a Boat, so they probably wore straw BOATERS.

'JUNE IS BUSTIN' OUT ALL OVER'

Well here we are unbelievably almost half way through 2021. This has been an extraordinary time in all our lives, but there is always something uplifting and hopeful about this time of year. Not forgetting the frost and giant hailstones we endured recently of course. So what about June which, like every month, has notable dates and I present to you but a few out of the 30. Is that a sigh of collective relief breezing across Beetham I detect?

Let us start at the beginning, a very good place to start. In the beginning June was known as seva monath by the Anglo Saxons, meaning the dry month {?} and it was actually the fourth month of the year. Prior to Julius Caesar coming to power there were only ten months in the year. The ever modest Julius created his own Julian calendar around 46BC, treating himself to two extra months and pushing June into sixth position.

Since then many notable events have happened. Here are just a few; some you may know I am sure.

June 1st. Being a youngster {?} I was surprised to discover that television licenses were introduced in Britain in 1946. At the time they cost two pounds - eighty five pounds and ninety two pence in todays money. June 2nd. Our beloved and hardworking monarch, Queen Elizabeth II, was crowned in Westminster Abbey, making solemn oaths she still stands by today.

June 6th. In 1944 marked D-Day, the invasion of Normandy by one million Allied Troops to liberate Western Europe from German Occupation.

June 9th. 1870 Charles Dickens dies of a stroke thought to have been brought on following an arduous tour of America and Canada. He was at his home at Gad's Hill Place, Kent. Purely selfish entry as he is my favourite author....

June 10th. The first Oxford and Cambridge boat race was held in 1829, Oxford being the winners. June 11th. In 1509 Henry the Eighth embarked upon his historic marital endeavours when he secretly married his former sister in law, Catherine Of Aragon. His life and those he lived beside still to this day keep us intrigued and provide endless film plots! There is even a new musical called 'The Six' doing the rounds shortly. June 15th. In 1215 this was an interesting day out for King John. He signed the Magna Carta thereby removing total authority from the Monarchy forever.

June 22nd. For cricket lovers this date in 1814 saw the opening of England's Lords Cricket Ground. The first match was played by Marylebone Cricket Club and Hertfordshire. The MCC won by seven wickets, and Aaron Finch scored 181 runs.

Same Date but in 1969. John Lennon and Yoko Ono recorded ' Give Peace A Chance ' whilst sharing their 'bed in' with the world.

June 29th. On this date in 1613 a fire caused by flames from a fired cannon used to announce the arrival of the King in Shakespeare's Henry VI totally destroyed the London Globe Theatre. I like to think he would be thrilled with the renovations!

These are but snippets of information, to entertain mostly, and so to finish I return to the title of this piece. June Is Bustin' Out All Over. It comes from Carousel, written by Rodgers and Hammerstein in 1956. If you have been to recent flower festivals in Beetham Church, you will be familiar with our enthusiastic renditions from this wonderful musical which encompasses just about everything. So in acknowledgement of the beauty that surrounds us I leave you with these uplifting lyrics and a smile I hope
