Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends

'Let the peoples praise you, O God; let all the peoples praise you. Then shall the earth bring forth her increase, and God, our own God, will bless us. God will bless us, and all the ends of the earth shall fear him.' Psalm 67.5-7

One of the consequences of being a native Cumbrian is that it's very easy to take for granted the place where we are privileged enough to live. Growing up on the Solway Firth and in easy reach of the Lakeland fells and Lake District means that whenever I'm driving around the county, it's easy to become complacent to the beauty and scenery that surrounds us.

We are encompassed, if we but care to look, by evidence of God's majesty and honour writ large in the natural world, in mountains and seas, in hills and rivers, in landscapes and sights that can serve to lift the spirit heavenwards and prompt us to consider what it means to know the presence of the divine round about us. 'The world is charged with the grandeur of God' wrote the nineteenth century priest and poet Gerard Manley Hopkins, yet so often amid the tedium and trials of life it can be easy for us not to take notice.

As we come to the time of the year when as a community of faith, we seek to 'raise the song of harvest home' our attention is quite rightly fixed on giving thanks for the goodness of God all around us. In the natural world, in the food we eat, in the houses we live, in all those gifts of grace which we are called to recognise are not the fruits of our own effort or endurance, but rather in the Christian story, are bestowed upon us the God our Father who knows us each personally by name.

Such gratefulness for God's generosity is at the heart of true thankfulness, the reminder that everything around us isn't to be seen as the result of our own endeavour or effort, but rather a reminder of God's kindness towards us. It is for this reason that John Wesley once remarked that 'thanksgiving is inseparable from true prayer...one who prays is ever giving praise'.

This does not mean that we are called to be cheerful for the sake of it, imbued with a false sense of optimism or positivity because that's how we feel we should be. Instead, we give praise because we know what it means to trust in a God who longs to bless us, so that in return we might impart that blessing to others. Hence, what we ourselves receive from God we are invited to give away liberally and freely, meaning that we are ever seeking to work for the building up, the encouraging and the helping of others.

We have many opportunities to do this in daily living, often in hidden and non-earth-shattering ways, but acts of goodness and mercy in which the loving faithfulness of the Lord is revealed. In taking time to talk and spend time with others, in supporting charities that seek to work for the relief of need, want and poverty in our own country and around the world, and above all through prayer – prayer for each other, prayer for the world, prayer for all those facing fear and distress, anxiety and uncertainty.


All this forms part of our Harvest celebrations, our marking out of this time of year in which in giving thanks for the fruits and produce of the land, we turn our gaze both to God and to the world, recognising our part, and the unique contribution only we can make, to God's purposes in our own day.

So this Harvest, we give thanks that the world and indeed our own lives are charged with God's grandeur and grace. We recall our responsibility to the planet and its people, our neighbours and communities, friends, and strangers alike. And most of all, we record our appreciation for all that we receive, asking that in doing so we might be truly thankful.


> A HOME AND SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN ORPHANED BY AIDS IN KENYA
