## OUR ENDOWMENT

*Endowment from the Dictionary* **endowment** in'dau.mənt  
*NOUN* : A gift, in particular that with which something is endowed; a gift to ensure the future.

You may already be familiar with the use of the word in financial terms – a sum of money given to enable a fund to be established for the long term.

But the word endowment has a wider meaning than just a monetary one: we can also use it to describe any gift intended for perpetual benefit. For example: “The Princess of Wales is endowed with an easy charm and good humour which seems never to desert her”., and there are no doubt many more possible examples of the use of the term in this “giftedness” manner.

We have very recently completed the reordering project in the Church building, creating much more usable space yet being especially careful to retain the fine craftsmanship which defines the character of the interior and the sense of special place.

Very recently, one of our regular church member’s first impressions prompted him to say “Wow, it looks like a cathedral!” Is, then, the Parish Church of St Michael and All Angels in Beetham “The Cathedral of South Westmorland” you may well ask? It IS at the centre of our village and has been, for over a thousand years. It is and has always been at the centre of life here: baptisms, weddings and funerals; regular services of worship and the nucleus of social life too. Evidence of this is offered by the remains of the Market Cross in the churchyard.

In this sense, then, the Church is indeed “Our Endowment”. But the Church is not merely the building: it is, more importantly, the people who are the Church. That is all of us, whether we realise it or not. Our endowment is, therefore, the dedication, hard work and generosity of time and resources of all those who support it and invest their efforts into keeping it so.

I find it thought-provoking that the National Trust, that sheet-anchor preserver of so much of our Nation’s heritage, has recently proclaimed that it cannot be relied upon to sustain the upkeep of further land and buildings unless a substantial sum of money is provided as an endowment for ongoing upkeep and maintenance costs. There is no escaping the reality that things do cost money. Of course, I am NOT proposing that we surrender our local treasure – perish the thought!

But my point is this: it is WE who are the endowment that sustains the Church, its building and all that goes on in and around it! And, by this, I do not simply mean our money, but rather the time, care, concern, promotion, attention and support that so many give freely.

Thank you all – and do please continue to do all you can in whatever way possible.

Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends,

As I write these words, peoples and nations across the world are once again coming to terms with the reality and pain of war. The escalating and deepening conflict in Israel and Gaza and the immense suffering being felt by communities across the Holy Land is, as our news coverage reminds us, a cause of particular concern, worry and anxiety for so many.

Perhaps, even more than usual we feel that our thoughts, prayers and our actions are to be inadequate to the demands of the time; not sure of what can be done to stem the hatred, bitterness and enmity that divides nations, communities and relationships in such painful ways. When we view this alongside the ongoing war in Ukraine, and the sectarian conflicts common to so many nations including at the moment in Sudan, we can be left feeling at the best disheartened and the worst lacking in any sense of meaningful hope. We live in an age where the reality of war is ever-present and where the promise of peace seems, too often, a distant dream.

In the acceptance speech made in the auditorium of the University of Oslo on December 1964 when he accepted the Nobel Prize for Peace, Martin Luther King said this:

*‘Sooner or later all the people of the world will have to discover a way to live together in peace, and thereby transform this pending cosmic elegy into a creative psalm of brotherhood. If this is to be achieved, man must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression and retaliation. The foundation of such a method is love.’*

As a committed Christian, and as one who understood the need for the justice, reconciliation and peace given in the Scriptures, Martin Luther King - despite the particular trials that he endured - looked forward to a day when the ‘pending cosmic elegy of war’ would give way to a ‘creative psalm of brotherhood’. Recognising that humanity needed to look beyond itself, and ultimately to God, to find the help and encouragement needed to bring this about.

In the Old Testament prophecy of Micah, writing in the eighth century BC and in a time beset by war, factionalism, and trouble, we find these words:

*‘Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths.’*  
*For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem.*  
*He shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away;*  
*they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks;*  
*nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more.’*

They are words which continue to challenge us still today, not least when the peacefulness of which Micah spoke can seem so remote from our knowledge of how we know the world to be. And yet in doing so, though written for altogether different world and time, they hold before us a vision - hopeful and persistent - of the world and human society as God intends it to be. When in learning the ways of the Lord and having confidence to walk in his paths, we find the courage and means to beat swords into ploughshares and spears into pruning hooks, to dispense attitudes of enmity and hatred and to seek first that which work for peace and builds up the common life we share.

In the month of November, we think on these things with particular focus as draw near to the time when - in solidarity with generations past - we stand in solemn remembrance, bringing to mind not only the cost of war and the price of peace. Calling to mind as we do our commitment to being peace of people today through our actions as well as our prayers.

In doing so we remember that Christianity is, above all, a faith rooted in hope, and that those who follow in the way of Jesus Christ are called to be people of hope in a world where it can often seem in short supply. A hope that shines light in darkness, brings love amidst fear, reconciles that which is divided, and proclaims the reliability of the life God gives even in death’s dark shadow. Looking forward to a day when ‘nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more.’

For those who saw it years ago at the beginning of the restoration, they were amazed at the transformation which is still on-going but is all thanks to the owner, Brian, and to Ruth and their volunteers. After a walk back to Wolf House Café a hot drink and cake helped dry us out!



The following week we were introduced to the ancient Chinese art of mindful exercises called 'Qigong' by Debra Haddaway. All those who took part enjoyed the thought provoking and relaxing exercises. Some of the committee attended information sessions at the Federation's offices in Kendal during October where it was also a chance to meet up with others in our Cumbria-Westmorland group.

We have had a couple of sessions at the M:Hub enjoying Friday morning coffee whilst making yellow poppies and wreaths. We will be laying a yellow wreath at Beetham's War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday in memory of the thousands of women who worked in munitions factories during the two World Wars. Those that worked with the toxic chemicals (TNT) found their skin and hair turned yellow and they were nicknamed 'The Canary Girls'. Though the colour disappeared, in time, many had various long-term health effects. Some even gave birth to yellow babies. The people who worked in these factories were also at great risk of being killed or injured from tragic accidents on site as well as possible bombings.
