everything with content often pushing an agenda or selling them something. Teenagers may feel social peer pressure in school, their community, or their family, and when using social media.



(and stress about it!) Many will manage this as 'just another teenage pressure.' However, a large minority will struggle, they may become increasingly introverted and isolated from 'real life.' They may be subjected to inappropriate sexual content on their phones, creating a distorted idea of what healthy behaviour looks like. They may develop harmful addictive habits, and resulting mental health difficulties at an age when they should be just enjoying healthy relationships with their contemporaries. Additionally, there is widespread availability of illegal drugs, including vapes and the usual pressures on teenagers to 'take risks' which, whilst an endemic part of their development, may be distorted by exposure to extremes of behaviour on the internet.

Against this background, government funding for youth work has dried up . KEY is a charity set up to counteract this loss of provision for young people by creating safe places to develop their physical, social, and emotional skills in a fun environment.

KEY employs 2 full time youth workers and sessional staff to run 6 youth clubs. The junior clubs for school years 7 to 9 are held straight after school in Arnside, Storth, Milnthorpe and Levens. The senior clubs for school years 10+ are held in Arnside and Milnthorpe later in the evening. The young people at each club choose their activities under the guidance of the youth workers but they are focused on fun ways to enjoy sports, cooking, and creative skills. Many of the young people who attend our clubs come from disadvantaged backgrounds and may have problems with social interaction. Through developing friendship groups in the safe environment that KEY creates, these youngsters have been able to integrate to the extent that some of them are now training with us to become young leaders.



In addition to the clubs, we organise adventure weekends away through the year. We also provide the government sponsored HAF (Holiday Activities & Food) programme in the school holidays and we join in with community activities and fundraisers. We continue to strive to expand the horizon of possibility for the young people and enhance their balanced development in a challenging world.

### What help can you give us?

Whilst the professional staff run the youth work, we need volunteers for additional support at the clubs, to join our Board of Trustees or act as mentors to youth workers. Club volunteers can support activities by helping with cooking, baking, crafts, sports etc. depending on the volunteers' own interests and skills. But mostly the vital role that they can provide is a listening ear and supportive friendly face for the young people attending. Our Board of Trustees currently has six members. We need to increase this to eight so we are looking for people interested in this role.

## **Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman**

What can be said in New Year rhymes, That's not been said a thousand times?

The new years come, the old years go, We know we dream, we dream we know.

We rise up laughing with the light, We lie down weeping with the night.

We hug the world until it stings, We curse it then and sigh for wings.

We live, we love, we woo, we wed, We wreathe our brides, we sheet our dead.

We laugh, we weep, we hope, we fear, And that's the burden of the year.

These words by the nineteenth century American poet Ella Wheeler Wilcox in her poem 'The Year' express something of the inevitable reflectiveness that comes as we contemplate the turning of the year, bidding farewell to the old and preparing to welcome in the new. Such musing, as the poem suggests, brings with it an awareness of the very ordinary nature of noticing the passage of time. The reality that though we are encouraged, not least in our own day, to aim for a 'happy', 'healthy' and 'successful' new year, we can never avoid the very ordinariness of life and the truth that each year will always include that rich tapestry of emotions and circumstances which is the essence of our human condition. Joy and sadness, pleasure and pain, hope and disappointment, life and death.

I once heard it said in a sermon when I was at theological college that 'God is in the world as poetry is in the poem'. And the wonderful, if sometimes all too unbelievable, claim of the Christian faith is that God's presence in the world, his love and commitment towards his creation means that he is alongside us in and through all of our life's twists and turns. A promise and pledge he has made permanent in the manger of Bethlehem, and in the hopefulness of the Christmas season, the light of which we continue to rejoice in as we begin the new year.

In his essay, 'Myth becomes Fact', the writer and Christian apologist, C. S. Lewis writes 'Now, we know where times move. They move away. But in religion we find something that does not move away.' All too often, perhaps especially, as we look out into a new year, balancing both the excitement of its possibility and the anxiety which comes from its unpredictability, we can feel that we don't know which way to go. In our world write large and then in everyday lives we see evidence of variation and transition, change and decay. A changeableness that can lead us into a fearfulness born of the unexpected and of not knowing where we are headed.

It is into such feelings and situations that God comes. Making himself known and inviting us - with each day and every passing year - into friendship and fellowship. Into a relationship of trust and faith, where we ask for help so as to live our lives and face all that lies ahead with the assurance of a comfort and joy only he can offer and bring. The one who, in Christ, is the same yesterday, today and forever. The one who is ever moving towards us, despite our attempts to go in the opposite direction, and who tells us repeatedly that he will never leave or forsake us, whatever the days, months and years might bring.

May you, and all those whom you love, pray and care for, know the Lord's presence and peace as we look ahead to this new year of grace.

"I'm writing to say a very sincere thank you for the toy donations from your friends, neighbours and St Michael and All Angels Church. As you can see from the picture, you collected a huge amount of toys, and a wonderful selection.

We send out right up until Christmas Day itself as we don't want any children to go without. And we give every child a selection of presents: toy, game, art/craft item, book, cuddly toy, toiletries, chocolate selection box, and a number of stocking fillers. Many parents aren't able to provide anything else for their children so we try to make sure that Santa does a reasonable job!

We also send out a roll of wrapping paper for each child and a roll of Sellotape per family, so that the parents know what their children are receiving, and can wrap them themselves.

Many families are struggling massively to provide food day-to-day, before the extra pressure of Christmas, so we provide Aldi vouchers (that can't be used for alcohol, tobacco or lottery) that enables them to choose their Christmas dinner. We couldn't do it without your help"

### **Brightening Beetham**

The Big Switch-on for this year's Brightening Beetham project took place on Saturday 2nd December, made all the more festive with snow lying on the ground

With grateful thanks to Beetham Nurseries for all the trees, and to all the individual and business sponsors for their donations for each tree, twelve trees were erected this year in the churchyard and around the village. The trees, church porch and rose pergola were all decorated with fairy lights timed to come on at 4pm each day, and thanks go to Tess for her organisation and the volunteer teams of tree erectors and light fitters who worked so hard to make everything work

The Switch-on countdown attracted plenty of people from the village, who were treated to mince pies, mulled wine, and music from the Beetham Community Band inside the church. The outdoor crib was lit up at the same time in a reminder of the message that it brought to the village during the pandemic lockdown in 2020. The lights will continue to 'Brighten Beetham' in Christmastide until Candlemas









The traditional Christingle service was held on Christmas Eve with a record attendance of 257 adults and children. The children were able to bring the Nativity figures up to the Crib during the singing of the carols, and Revd Andrew led the telling of the story of Christ's birth as well as the history of the Christingle with the church lit by candlelight




