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Dear Friends,

Once upon a time there were Tics who lived on the moon. They were very intelligent and civilised and looked rather similar to human beings. Most of them were green in colour but a fair number of them were red. They had large centres of industry, cities, rivers, fields, and seas just as we do. By and large they were a contented people who got on with the business of living.

There were some Tics, however, who kept on writing to the papers about the danger of pumping more and more polluted smoke into the atmosphere, declaring that, if this went on much longer, the atmosphere would become poisoned and life would cease.

Those who read the papers shrugged their shoulders and said, 'How awful! But what can we do about it?'

There were other Tics called Scientics who from time to time appeared on the television and spoke at length about farmers who used poisonous sprays on the land in order to produce better crops. These sprays soaked into the ground, and when it rained were washed into nearby brooks, killing all the life in streams and rivers and destroying the balance of nature. Those Tics who listened became so depressed that they switched over to another channel to something more cheering. Anyway most of them lived in towns and cities. What could they do to influence those who lived in the country?

Occasionally there were Moon Conferences attended by delegates from different countries, to consider the pollution of the seas. After each conference each government was gravely warned that unless alternative methods of sewage disposal were employed, the seas would die, and one of the major sources of oxygen would cease production. Tics all over the moon listened to these warnings and left it to the government to deal with. 'What,' they asked themselves, 'can an individual do to tackle such a moon-wide problem?'

Then there was the colour question. In certain countries the green Tics resented the presence of a red Tic minority. In other countries the red Tics resented the green Tic minority. A tiny number of Tics organized protest marches and demonstrations to highlight this colour problem, but the vast majority of Tics looked upon these marchers and demonstrators as a lot of Fanatics, and ignored their warnings about an ever deteriorating situation.

As we know, the moon today is dead. There is absolutely no evidence of life at all. These Tics were clearly the original Lunatics.

Jesus was well aware of the power of stories, and that is why he taught in parables so often. He drew on the experience of daily life to teach about human relationships and about our relationship with God and his creation. The story of the Lunatics is a modern parable and it reminds us of some important issues as we come once again to the Harvest Festival season.

If we lived on the moon, as members of the Church we would be Ecclesiastics. We would be entertained at our Harvest Supper by the Dramatics. Those who lived in the far north would be Arctics, and those in the far south Antarctics. Don't be confused between Arctics and those flexible beings known as Artics, or you are certain to corrected by the Pedantics.

Beetham Church - Who Were They?

There is evidence that Beetham Parish Church was established in Saxon times, and there has been a long-held view that it may have been dedicated to Saint Lioba, a cousin of Saint Boniface, at that time. In this first of a series of heritage articles looking at the people celebrated in our window and memorial inscriptions in the church, it seems appropriate to start with the earliest name recorded



Lioba was born in the Kingdom of Wessex about 710 AD and was educated at the Benedictine convents of Minster on the Isle of Thanet and at Wimborne in Dorset, where she became director of the novices

She was still a comparatively young nun when she was asked by Boniface to join him in his missionary work of bringing Christianity to the Low Countries and to Germany. The Emperor Charlemagne gave them strong support, and Lioba and Hildegard, Charlemagne's Queen, became great friends. Lioba died in 780 AD and was buried beside Boniface in Fulda Cathedral

The festival of Saint Lioba is celebrated at the end of September, one day before the feast day of St Michael and All Angels, to whom Beetham Parish Church was dedicated after the Norman Conquest. This closeness of feast day dates led to a questioning of whether the dedication to St Lioba ever existed. There only appears to have been a single historical reference to Lioba, leading Frances Arnold-Forster to state in his 'Studies in Church Dedications ~ Volume 2', published in 1899:-

"The only authority for associating it with the name of S. Lioba is a certain early eighteenth-century antiquarian, Machell by name, who, without giving any grounds for his statement, says in his account of Beetham : "The church is dedicated to S. Lioba or Liobgytha". This is very unsatisfactory, but it is difficult to believe that Mr. Machell had not some reason for the assertion. If there were no historic connexion, what should have suggested the introduction of this little-known Wessex abbess into a far-away region with which she can have had no natural concern? The suggestion, if entirely baseless, is almost as difficult to account for as the reality could be. We look in vain for any light on the matter from the date of the village feast, for whereas S. Michael's Day is September 29, S. Lioba's is September 28; a confusion between two days so near to one another would inevitably arise, and, equally inevitably, the less-known feast-day would be merged in the better-known."

The statue shows Lioba dressed in the habit of a Benedictine nun; the bell in her right hand is a reminder of a dream of her mother, who heard it ringing when she learnt she was to give birth to Lioba





BEETHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWSLETTER ISSUE No 31 JULY – SEPTEMBER 2017

Things tend to become quieter in the summer months and, of course, the Parish Council does not meet in August – when many residents and members are away on holiday.

The BPC map board project is progressing well, albeit slowly in view of the amount of detail to be considered and space limitations of the board itself. Thanks must go to Arnside & Silverdale AONB for providing invaluable advice and facilities. The boards are expected to be installed well before the 2018 summer season. The Slackhead signpost is also nearing completion and will in due course become an attractive historical asset at the Slackhead junction.

The defibrillator project for Beetham village remains ongoing. The Stanley Street phone box is no longer the preferred location due to the prospect of continuing maintenance costs and Beetham School premises have been rejected by the local First Responders as being too far from the village centre. Hope now rests on Beetham PCC agreeing to the equipment being sited in the church porch. We will report on this as soon as a decision is forthcoming, when we can turn our attention to sourcing the equipment.

The Speed Indicator Device (SID) will be on offer of loan to Beetham parish from October 2017, but there have been technical/upkeep problems with this shared equipment, leading to a decline of interest by the other parties involved. Another

factor is the increasing preference for the more sophisticated 'smiley' type devices in a number of neighbouring parishes, which appear to be more effective in controlling traffic speeds. These devices are not available on loan and are comparatively expensive to buy – but may be justified if they ultimately save lives.

There have been some developments of the Beetham village 'ghost' footpath. As a result of road resurfacing, the path lines were temporarily obscured. When they were eventually repainted, additional lines were added on the other side of the road in an effort to visibly decrease the width of the road for traffic and increase the space available to pedestrians. Moreover, the former 'SLOW' and '20 mph' road markings were not reinstated. These changes have not been to everyone's satisfaction and the situation is once more under review.

The publication of the SLDC/AONB Development Plan Document (DPD) raised concerns amongst members of the public until it was explained that its purpose was to give all interested parties the opportunity to see in advance suggested use proposals by landowners and developers. This was the start of a lengthy process which would include a public consultation.

Another, more recent, matter of concern has been a proposal by the NW Coastal Access Delivery Team for a gap in the coastal path between Arnside and Grange, so bypassing our parish altogether. Recent groundwork between Sandside Cutting and the Ship Inn had the object of improving drainage in that area – we shall see!


Finally – a reminder of the availability of grants from Beetham PC to support selected local projects. Applications for 2017/18 to be submitted by February 2018.
