Welcome to 2020. A new year. New beginnings. Traditionally, this is the month in which we can all start afresh. When we have a chance to put behind us the disappointments and difficulties of the past, the failed hopes and missed opportunities.

Why is it that at the start of each year we feel the urge to start again? What is it about our daily lives that makes us dissatisfied with the pattern of our existence to the extent that we feel the need to make a new beginning? Modern life makes many demands on us all. And we are all subject to the pressures and demands of a world of consumerism in which we are constantly invited to compare our own existence with the seeminaly far more attractive lifestyle of those who appear to have more than us in material terms, or who have a way of life that is made to appear more desirable.

And so we make our annual wish list of those things we intend to change: we are going to eat or drink less (or maybe both!); we are going to take more exercise; we are going to learn a new skill. Our experience tells us that it is unlikely that we shall persevere with any of our 'resolutions' - if we even begin them in the first place.

And yet there is one thing, I suggest, about which we should all make a resolution - a fresh beginning - and which we should be determined both to start and to continue. The world we live in - our very planet - is under threat. There is no longer any room for doubt - human activity is having a profound and ever-increasing effect on our climate and, in turn, our local weather. The resources of planet earth are being depleted at an ever increasing rate.

We desperately need for governments around the world to take the macro-actions necessary to slow, and eventually end, the activities that contribute to the crisis - and, let us be in no doubt, crisis it is. So what can we do in this quiet, and still beautiful, corner of north-west England? What can we do, as individuals, to slow, halt, and even reverse, the activities that are responsible for the crisis we are facing? Well, I suggest, there are some things we can all resolve to do to help. Our modern world is reliant on electricity. Many of us remember the early 1970s when political unrest resulted in power cuts - blackouts, candles, shortages of fuel and even some foodstuffs. How much more devastating would such cuts be today when the technology which controls and directs so much of our daily life is dependent on a reliable and consistent supply of electric power?

Electricity has to be produced and that production comes at a cost. The less we use of it, the less we add to the growth in carbon emissions that are having such a devastating impact on our world. So, turn off unnecessary lights and change to LED bulbs (we have already done this in church with the result that we have better illumination at far less cost). Water has to be pumped into our homes: don't leave the tap running while you clean your teeth - you will save both water and electricity. Central Heating contributes massively to carbon emissions: turn down your thermostat by one degree - you won't notice the difference (until your bill arrives!). In an area so poorly served by public transport it is difficult not to use our cars, but we can try to use them more efficiently.

Individually we can do little. Collectively we can make a big difference. If we don't, the opportunity to make new beginnings may be denied to our grandchildren. And what will they think of us then? What do we want our legacy to be?

### The Feast of the Epiphany $\sim$ 6th January

In the Oxford English Dictionary, Epiphany is defined as:-1. The manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12)

1.1 The festival commemorating the Epiphany on 6 January 2. A moment of sudden and great revelation or realization

The Feast of the Epiphany is a celebration of the birth



of Jesus. It marks the visit of the three wise men - the Magi - to pay homage to the infant Jesus, and their offering of gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

In Beetham church, the carved figures of the three wise men are moved from the far side of the church to the nativity scene on this day. Epiphany continues with the celebration of the baptism of Jesus by John and the revealing of Christ as the Son of God

The eve of Epiphany is also known as Twelfth Night. Beginning on St Stephens Day (Boxing Day), the Twelve Days of Christmas end on 6 January. However, until the Middle Ages the end of a day was marked when the sun went down, so Epiphany actually starts on the evening of 5 January. It is for this reason that the taking down of Christmas decorations (traditionally accompanied by the serving of a mulled spicy punch known as wassail!) is usually done on 5th January

#### Lioba – a Modern Woman



Tradition has it that this church of St Michael & All Angels was formerly dedicated to Saint Lioba. And, of course, there is an image of her in the stained glass window in the north-west corner of the church. But who was she? We know that she was born of Saxon parents in Wessex in about 700 AD (the original Wessex Girl!) and that she was a cousin of the rather more famous Boniface, a Christian Missionary who went to spread the Gospel to the tribes of what is now Germany. Boniface, in fact, became the patron saint of Germany, so Lioba was well-connected. (Boniface is also the patron saint of Devon!). As a child, Lioba went to live amongst the nuns at Wimborne Abbey in Dorset and later became Abbess of Minster in the Isle of Thanet. When Boniface sent for reinforcements, Lioba answered his call and was put in a position of authority over the missionaries and took charge of a convent in what is now the German province of Baden. She did good works and when she died she was buried near the tomb of Boniface (who had been martyred in 754 AD). Her tomb can be seen to this day in the church of Petersburg, near Fulda in modern Germany.

Recent research has discovered a surviving letter written by Lioba herself which contains the earliest example of poetry known to have been authored by an Englishwoman. Professor Diane Watt of the University of Surrey has written a book with the catchy title, Women, Writing and Religion in England and Beyond'. The book looks at early English writers, including Lioba, and Professor Watts suggests that before the Norman Conquest women writers were far more involved in the literary scene than has been acknowledged. In fact, women's literature was thriving in pre-Norman times and Lioba was a part of that culture.

If this is so, it would help to explain why a not very wellknown nun from the south of England became associated with a church so far removed from where she lived and worked. Beetham is on a direct trade route to the north. Travellers' tales could have been a source of stories about - or even by - Lioba. There is more research to be done. Watch this space


