Decluttering

Decluttering was the order of the day when a willing work party gathered in church at the end of July. The purpose was to remove everything that had been stored under pews and tables and in rickety cabinets and cupboards that had not seen the light of day for many years, in order to prepare for the reordering of the church

But what is decluttering? The first recorded use of the word clutter was in the 1500s when it meant a 'clotted mass', referring to a disorderly heap. The earliest reference to de-clutter, literally meaning 'the removal of clutter', was not until the 1940s. At this time it had a military association, where clutter referred to superfluous images on a radar screen and de-cluttering became the act of removing these images electronically. This idea of cleansing soon transferred to our homes in the 1950s and 60s, when it became fashionable to keep a clean and tidy house with most of our possessions stored out of sight

Nowadays there are plenty of YouTube videos about decluttering and books advising you how to simplify your material belongings. The TV show 'Sort Your Life Out' lays out the entire contents of someone's house and restricts how much can go back into their home. It has become the vogue for people selling their homes to be encouraged to declutter in order to make the property look more attractive and convince potential buyers that there is plenty of storage space. The term has even evolved to apply to decluttering your mind, improving mental health by simplifying your lifestyle and reducing the stress of modern-day multitasking and the instant demands of social media and technology

All of these concepts can seem daunting in reality - we all find it difficult to part with long-held items or change lifestyle habits, and the idea of trying to declutter everything in one go can sometimes prevent us even making a start. However, it is worth remembering that physical decluttering does not necessarily mean throwing away. It is about re-evaluating each item and deciding whether to keep it in its existing form, whether it can be repurposed for us to find a new use for ourselves, or whether someone else can use it by selling or giving away. Then if the answer to all of these is No we can consider recycling, and only as a last resort make the decision to throw it away. Take a look in one of your cupboards and try deciding which of these applies to everything you find in the there. You might be surprised at the result (and there may be long lost items that bring back happy memories or hidden treasure!), but if you find items that you no longer use please consider passing them on - particularly to the many charities that can help other people benefit from the things that you once cherished

Decluttering works just as well being done step-by-step as it does on the larger scale of everything at once. The latter certainly worked at church and careful decisions were made about every item, finding new homes for articles no longer needed wherever possible. However, those of us that have been temporarily storing church items whilst the reordering is being carried out are looking forward to decluttering our own houses again! Enjoy the results of your Autumn tidying...






Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends,

I am writing this letter after returning from serving as a Bishop's Adviser on a Discernment Panel for those offering themselves for ministry within the Church of England as potential priests. The highlight of the whole process was the chance to meet some remarkable people who, sensing God's call upon their lives, are prepared to step out into a new chapter and season of life. All of them already doing valuable work in various ways and in different walks of life, yet all equally feeling that there is something more for them to explore. All at different ages and



Although not all of us will be prompted to thinking about offering ourselves for ministry within the Church (though please do come and speak to me if you do!), we will all have all felt - at some time or another - a sense of knowing when was the right (or wrong) time to make a particular decision. Indeed, the routine and habit of daily life is that we make decisions, though not all ones of huge importance, each and every day. In how we interact with others, in how we elect to spend our time, in what or who we choose to make our priorities. Moreover, our freedom and ability to make those choices is, quite rightly, a precious gift, which lamentably for far too many across the world remains a liberty that is at best obstructed and at worst denied.

I ponder all this having learnt, for the first time, about the story of Franz Jägerstätter. A twentieth century Austrian farmer, remembered for his brave decision, during the years of the Second World War, to conscientiously object, from taking up arms as demanded by the Nazi government of the Third Reich. Despite repeated attempts to conscript Franz into military service, and whilst knowing the consequences of such actions for his own welfare and safety, he remained resolute. A decision that led to him being accused of 'undermining military morale' before being sentenced to death aged thirty-six in July 1943. Immediately before his execution Franz was given the option of signing a document to save his life; yet abjuring any complicity with the Nazi regime, he declined.

Initially maligned and criticised for failing in his duties to his country, and in his responsibilities as a husband and father. In more recent years Franz's act of defiant courage in the face of overwhelming evil, as motivated by his deeply held Christian faith, has rightly been acknowledged and celebrated. And with the benefit of historical hindsight, we can recognise and esteem the quiet bravery of his decision and his choice not to align himself with the forces of tyranny and oppression; but to take a stand for that which he knew and believed to be right.


On the night before his death, Franz wrote this: 'neither prison nor chains nor sentence of death can rob a man of faith and his free will'. At the end of all things Franz placed his trust in God and knew him to be faithful, even when faced with the loss of everything he held dear. Believing - in the words of the prayer - that only in God's service can be found 'our perfect freedom'. This freedom, our ability to make choices sometimes for ill but hopefully more often for the good, is the free will which God gives to us. As those whom he has created, loves, and called into relationship. A gift which is offered so that through lives of love, faith, and service we might know God's presence and through our lives might be means of his blessing in the world, in the various ways in which we might be able to make a difference.

The Old Testament book of Proverbs (3.5-6) gives us an indication of how we might do this, a good promise and encouragement for us all to remember as we look out to this new month:

'Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths.'



Church Reordering Update

During the week the church continues to look like something out of Great Expectations, but as The Gateway goes to print Phase 1 of the church reordering is nearing completion. Garfield Weston New flags have been laid in the areas cleared at the back of the church and the back



pews are being turned round to create seating in this area. Pews have been removed under the watchful eye of archaeologist Dan Elsworth, and we are grateful to Rupert and Susie Villiers-Smith for transporting and temporarily storing the surplus pews. Phase 2 flags have also been started at the front of the nave and new foundations laid in the side chancel spaces. Historic floor memorial stones have been revealed that were previously hidden by the pews. Heartwood Bespoke Joinery has completed the new organ/choir screen made out of reused pews and the storage units are in progress at their workshop.

However, this project is not just about reordering and the opportunity has also been taken to repair items identified in the Quinquennial report. After many years of gathering dust in a corner we are delighted that the Victorian font cover has been restored and securely rehung above the font by Mortimer Fabrications. The long-broken Tower door window and missing leaded lights in the vestry window have been expertly replaced, and the redundant 20 year old sound system wiring has been removed. The poor plaster and paintwork on the west wall is being made good, although other damaged walls in the church that deteriorated during covid will be left until the essential external repairs have been completed.

We are indebted to Elizabeth Rocke for her continuing success in grant applications, and to add to the






